## **Guardians Of The Children Bring Galactic Sized Help**

The Guardians of the Children- Show Me Midwest Chapter has had a very busy vear seeing a huge jump in membership numbers and events they have sponsored or attended. Their mission is clear. and their creed is "We stand as one prepared to protect this priceless resource; Valor, Truth, and Integrity is the Guardian Way".

The non profit organization consists of motorcycle bikers on a mission to protect victims of child abuse. These burly rough around the edges men and women have huge hearts and are dedicated to the cause of supporting victims and helping to end child abuse in all its forms.

The group is based out of Warsaw but meets in Clinton on the second Friday evening of each month at 7 p.m. at the Rotary Building. The Clinton Daily Democrat spoke with Shepherd, who was eager to promote his chapter and let interested people know that "if they wanted to help these kids, this is the right chapter for

you". If a rider is interested in joining it would be best to attend a meeting and see if they are the right fit for the Guardians. Membership has dramatically increased over the year, allowing the Chapter to hold more events and support more court cases for children in need. "Last year at this time, we were 6, and this year we have 14 patched members and 22 in total" said Shepherd. The group has done 42 events this year including Trunk or Treats, Ren-

nfest, and various Christmas activities. Perhaps most importantly, the bikers attended every court date of their " adopted children" and were a part of the "Justice For Jessica" court case in support of Benton County 4 year old Jessica Mast, who died as a result of abuse by her parents and neighbors. The bikers cannot intervene in court proceedings without parental consent according to Shepherd, which is hard in some cases when the abuse is perpetrated by those parents.

The main goal for Shepherd was " to get the word out" and spread awareness of this chapter and their missions, so they can support and help more children who are suffering. The organization is funded solely by donation and all of those donations go directly to victim support. The group also maintains a hotline for victims and families to easily reach out for help. # Clinton School District Responds To AG's Cease And Desist Letter



Following the Cole County Circuit Court's decision in Robinson v. Missouri Dept. of Health and Senior Services, Missouri Attorney General (AG) Eric Schmitt sent a letter to local public health agencies and school districts earlier this month. In the letters, he informed them of the decision from the court case, requiring them to stop enforcing any mask mandates, quarantine orders, or any other public health orders.

"The recent decision from the Cole County Circuit Court is consequential as it relates to public health orders. Today, I sent a letter to public health agencies and school districts across the state informing them of the decision and demanding they rescind and cease

enforcement and publicizing of public health orders, mask mandates, quarantine orders, or other orders that were declared null and void by the recent decision," said Attorney General Schmitt. "Public health authorities and school districts have gone unchecked, issuing illegal and unconstitutional orders in their quest to aggregate, maintain, and exert their newfound power. My Office will enforce the Court's order across the state."

Both letters argue that health orders, mask mandates, quarantine orders, or similar orders issued under previous statutes that were declared unconstitutional by the Robinson judgment are officially null and void and should not be enforced or publicized by the issuing

The Clinton Daily Democrat was able to catch up with Henry County Assessor Scott Largent last week.

It appears he is still getting calls over the address changes put in place by the Henry County Emergency Management folks a few years ago. Largent said that they modified 336 addresses according to the new 9-1-1 standards. Aside from that, Largent said that last year his office fielded 101 requests (where something was being built): "Not only do we have to create the new addresses," he said, "but we have to assign values and determine what is being built at those locations." The assessor's office created a total of 700 signs for the year - not just for address changes: some folks just needed new signs. As far as address changes, regarding the 9-1-1 system, the main problem is that Google Maps doesn't really have Henry County very high on their priority list of "things to

it is a matter of "flipping the switch" so that the new addresses will show up correctly for folks like UPS and FedEx, but Google apparently - has larger populated areas to keep maintenance on. Eventually they will (hopefully) get around to it. "We are low on the priority list" commented Assessor

As far as assessment forms, Largent said his office was proofing the last of the forms that will be sent out.

The county residents should be receiving Cont. Page 15





Just what did you learn in High School in 1899? Many schools had started to reform their education requirements by the turn of the 20th Century. The influence of John Dewey and William James, for instance, launched a progressive campaign of learning across the U.S. which included psychology and some relatively new sciences (think evolution, geology, and physics, for instance). However, the classic liberal arts were still present and emphasized. New to the education system was the idea of "electives" instead of a prescribed course of classes. Also somewhat new was the idea of college entrance exams hence, preparatory courses.

High Schools in 1899 were a little rare. In Henry County the one-room schoolhouse was still the predominant means of education and at one time there were over 100 in the county. Many kids would finish 8th grade and go to work on the farm or in a trade. In fact, having access to a high school education was the reason many folks moved to Clinton to begin with; they wanted something better for their kids.

A decade after the class of 1899 graduated (the Class of 1899 was the 21st graduating class at Clinton High School), the program of academics looked something like

Freshman - requirements of English, Algebra, and Ancient History with an elective of Latin, Bookkeeping, Geography or Manual Training

Sophomore - English, Algebra, Geometry (I & II), Medieval and Modern History with an elective of Latin, Zoology, or Manual Training

Junior – English with three electives of either Latin, German, Geometry (III & IV) or English History Senior – English with three electives of Latin, German, Physics, Trigonometry, or Advanced American History

A student could not count either bookkeeping or manual training towards collegiate entrance; both geography and physics required double periods of class at least three times per week. To graduate you had to have two units of Latin or German and you had to have at least one subject with a lab as well. Rhetoricals were required at the end each year to pass on to the next grade.

There was discussion on an upcoming vacancy to the board. Shingle Shots have been an ongoing service. After discussion, Commissioner Fosnow made a motion to approve the Senior Citizens Service Tax Fund. Commissioner Lawler seconded the motion. The letter to school boards stated, "Under this judgment, all mask mandates, quarantine orders, and other public health orders that are based on any of the invalidated regulations or issued outside the protections of the Mis-Administrative souri Procedure Act are null and void. We have advised local public health authorities today to stop enforcing and publicizing any such orders immediately. You also should stop relying on, enforcing, or publicizing any such orders immediately. In addition, state law does not delegate authority to school officials to issue mask mandates, quarantine orders, or other public health orders. Your school district should stop enforcing and publicizing any such orders

immediately." Both letters ended with the following statement: "Failure to follow the court's judgment may result in enforcement against you to remove orders the court has determined are unconstitutional or illegal. We encourage you to take immediate action to remove all unconstitutional and illegal orders."

This has caused several local health departments to cease any and all contact tracing, quarantine/isolation guidance, and reporting of case numbers related to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Henry County Health Center has not publicly commented on AG Schmitt's letter and continues to provide COVID-19 case number updates on their Facebook page. A representative from the Clinton

attempts to reach out to Peggy Bowles, Administrator, but she was unavailable for comment before time of press. In communications with The Democrat previously, Bowles stated "After sitting in on the call with our attorney on Tuesday, HCHC will continue business as usual in regards to COVID-19 prevention. To-date, HCHC has not passed any orders (mask or otherwise) and does not intend to in the future. Our stance has always been to protect the health and wellbeing of our citizens by educating and making recommendations based on CDC guidelines."

The Clinton School

District continues to up-

date the public of positive cases within the district's various schools on their Facebook page as well as on the COVID-19 Dashboard, which can be found on their clintoncardinals.org website. The Dashboard has four tables. The first table shows data surrounding current COVID-19 cases, broken down by students and staff, as well as the numbers of individuals currently on quarantine and those who have tested to stay in school. The second table provides COVID-19 numbers since the first day of school in the 2021-22 school year, the third table shows resolved case data by month from August through December, 2021, and the fourth table provides COVID-19 case numbers within the community. District Superintendent Destry Brown commented "Missouri which means that school boards have the jurisdiction to make decisions concerning their school". Brown went on to say that on the advice from the school districts attorney, the Clinton School Board will continue to make decisions about its students and that the letter from Ag Schmitt didn't really affect the district.

"As has been our practice during COVID-19 pandemic, the Clinton School District is committed to communicating with our stakeholders information regarding positive cases in our schools. We will continue to notify families and our community of positive cases in our schools by placing general notifications on our Facebook page and on our website. We will continue to send phone calls out every evening to families whose child was in a class, activity, or bus where a possible exposure might have occurred. In addition, students or staff members that must quarantine due to exposure at school are contacted directly by the Henry County Health Center or the district nurse. In addition to these layers of communication, we will also be sharing a COVID-19 Dashboard

every Friday evening." On Monday, December 13, AG Schmitt responded to the Lee's Summit School District's attorney with another letter, stating "You ignore well-settled precedent that the Attorney General enforces the law and protests the public from injury to the general welfare. Aside from the clear legal reasoning, it is my firm belief that health decisions and mask decisions are best left to parents, not school administrators or government bureau-AG Schmitt has also

crats." asked for parents to report school districts that were enforcing mask mandates and quarantine orders to email their concerns to him. He locally-controlled has reportedly received more than 7,500 emails to date. Due to this, he sent 52 cease and desist letters to school districts across the state. Each letter Schmitt sent was a direct result of receiving a complaint from someone involved in each school district, Schmitt said.

> "We've received a tremendous response from parents who are fed up

with school districts across the state continuing to force their children to wear a mask all day or quarantine when they're perfectly healthy," Schmitt said. "My office has worked diligently to identify non-compliant school districts and send cease and desist letters to those districts. We will continue to fight these mask mandates and quarantine orders and enforce the law."

In a statement released last Friday, Schmitt reportedly took credit for "a number of school districts that have either already rescinded or plan to rescind their mask mandates, quarantine orders."

Aside from the Lee's Summit School District, Jackson County and St. Louis County have both filed a motion to intervene in the court ruling that took away the ability for school districts and public health officials to enforce and issue health orders. Both counties stated that they want to "preserve the regulations that have enabled local public health authorities to address all matters of public health, not just COVID-19."

Schmitt is a Republican running for U.S. Senate in the state of Missouri for 2022. He assumed office for Attorney General in 2019 after being appointed to the position by Governor Mike Parson, following former Attorney General Josh Hawley's election to the U.S. Senate in November of 2018. Schmitt previously served as the Republican treasurer of Missouri from 2017 to 2019, as well as a member of the Missouri State Senate, representing District 15. He was first elected to the state senate in 2008 but did not seek re-election in 2016 due to being term-limited, so he then filed to run for treasurer of Missouri in the 2016 election.

At the time of press, Governor Parson has not gone on record to discuss the recent ac-

Also according to Shields. the statement, Coble allegedly reported Trogdon's stolen.

Law enforcement researched Trogdon's cell phone records, and determined the phone was present at the scene of the crime on the theft dates.

With attorney Mitchell present, Judge Baker reviewed defendant's the current crime and past stealing convictions.

"You being are prosecuted as persistent offender," stated the judge sternly.

Trogdon then admitted guilt all of the previous convictions from the Johnson County (Overland Park) area. Mitchell Attorney discussed the plea agreement with Judge Baker and

Prosecutor Richard Shields.

"The agreement is for 7 years," Mitchell said. "That is correct," said

Upon acceptance of the plea, Baker pickup then found Trogdon guilty and went over sentencing guidelines.

> "I will ask the state sentencing assessment," Baker said. "We will schedule for a court date for that."

Baker also stated that he may follow the assessment, plea, give more jail time or less.

Trogdon stated he understood that.

The felon appeared on his own recognizance, having been released on a \$15,000 bail in November of 2020.

The defendant will appear again sentencing at 9 a.m. on February 22, in the Circuit Court of Henry County at the courthouse in Clinton. If the judge agrees to jail time, Trogdon will be immediately incarcerated, with eventual transfer to the Missouri Department of Corrections.

Online completion is the easiest - especially if there are only a few (or no) changes to be made. When should you have them in? "The sooner the better," said Largent. The actual deadline is March 1 to avoid penalty, but get them in: the assessor's office is no longer in control of the late penalties concerning late forms, the state of Missouri is.

Almost all assessed values went up because of the recent conditions. market However, it should also be noted that almost all of the county's taxing entities rolled back their levies as required by state statute. Approximately half of the tax bills related to assessed values were lower because of that.

The assessor's office sent out 8,503 initial "value change" notices and 73 add on "value change" notices.

The assessor's office received 587 appeals covering 1,192 parcels. Of those appeals, they adjusted 221, of which 193 of those were reduction adjustments

and 28 were value increases.

The assessor's office records and makes changes for well over 1,700 property transfers per year which includes verifying the legal descriptions of transferred property, historical changing records of deed in the files, and sending out letters of sale for each transfer, and also recording the data for statistical analysis and changing the parcel boundaries in the assessor's computer system, mapping overlays, and plat book files.

The assessor's office also mails out 11,230 personal property assessment and 923 business assessment forms. This represents 33,942 vehicles and 179,047 animals in Henry County.

The assessor's office printed over 120 plat books and printed and distributed over 350 address signs. The office also works with Henry County Road and Bridge to print and cut letters for hundreds of road signs in the county.

The total real estate value for Henry County is just over \$1.5 billion. Personal property values adds another \$276,000,000.

The assessor's office operate with 6 staff; it receives no money from the county's general revenue funds. No money from the county goes to any of the office's expenditures, salaries, supplies, projects, equipment, or vehicles. The assessor's office does not get any more money regardless of whether assessed values go up or down.

The assessor's office is visited at least one time per month from the Missouri State Tax Commission to ensure compliance. They run statistical analysis to ensure compliance with state law. Should the office fall out of compliance, the state can (and will) mandate adjustments. The **State Tax Commission** also verifies the values and/or appraises the properties owned by local elected officials.

Trinity Lutheran Church's Christmas services schedule for the remainder of this week is as follows: December 24th, Friday at 7 PM - Candlelight Christmas Eve Service

December 26th, Sunday at 10 AM - Divine Service. Unlike most other churches, Lutheran ministers are not "hired." They cannot be "fired." Lutheran pastors are called by God through a local congregation to serve Christians at a particular church, and there he remains until he is called by God to serve a different Lutheran congregation in another place. It is God who chooses a Lutheran pastor to serve a particular congregation.

Lutheran ministers are not the "Chief Executive Officer" (CEO) of the church to which they are called. Lutheran pastors are not in charge of a congregation's budget, finances, marketing or other day-to-day operational activities of the church they serve. The pastor is not "the boss." The congregation where he serves is not "his church."

A Lutheran pastor is a "called and ordained "Servant of the Word." He oversees and is in charge of "all things spiritual" within the congregation. He directs the Divine Service, and is responsible for faithfully proclaiming the gospel, the administration of the sacraments, and ensuring sound doctrine is taught and good practices are followed in accordance with the Bible, and the doctrines of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. 


